Dr. Ling is a native of Chongqing, China. He moved to Taiwan at a very young age. In his 37 years teaching at Franklin College, he served as the Director of the International Studies Program, Chairman of the Political Science Department and the First Head of the Social Science Division. In 1989, Dr. Ling was endowed as the Williams Chair in Law and Public Service until his retirement in 2009. Dr. Ling has earned many awards including a recent Lifelong Achievement from the American Association for Chinese Studies in 2010. In this photo show Dr. Ling will share his collection of “Images of My Roots”. He will present a power point along with actual photos.

Professor Roe is a faculty at Art Department in Azusa Pacific University. She will share her observation and reflection of life and objects. As she stated:

“I like to create photos that reflect my interest in time and in light/dark. I rarely take just one photo of anything but create a series of images that suggest either of these aspects of what the object is. Sometimes I even try to take a picture of light or dark – in relationship to the object. I attempt to slow it down and make people look -something they might see every day but do not notice – but something that is important to the space that we live in. I purposefully use film for my photos because that process in itself is a way of slowing down and creating a sense of mystery by forcing me to wait to see what the image actually is that I’ve taken a photograph of. Digital photography happens too fast, allows for in-camera corrections, and negates the mystery of photography that I’ve always valued. “
